Emma Revie, the CEO of the Trussell Trust comments on the government's Spring Statement:

"Today the Chancellor has failed to create any security for people on the lowest incomes by failing to bring benefits payments in line with the true cost of living in his spring statement. This decision has created a real terms cut to Social Security payments which remain dangerously insufficient.



"People are already making impossible decisions between heating and eating, and we know adults are skipping meals, unable to afford to run cookers and fridges and taking on debt to buy the essentials. This is not right.

"This decision will mean many more people will have no option but to use a food bank. By failing to make benefits payments realistic for the times we

face, the government is risking turning the cost of living crisis into an emergency. People cannot afford to wait another year for this to be reviewed. **Action to rectify this situation and strengthen our social security system needs to happen immediately.**

Simon, Truro Foodbank manager reports:

The Chancellor's Spring Statement will have the greatest impact on people with the lowest incomes; This comes on top of the drastic fall in income for this group during 2020/21 when, mainly because of Covid, household income fell by 42% for the 20% of households on the lowest income. (ONS 13/09/21). State benefits will rise by 3% from 5th April but inflation is predicted to rise to 8% this month. This means that around 9 million households on means tested benefits due to low incomes, both in and out of work, will experience an average real terms cut of £500 per year. Couple families with children, in receipt of benefits due to low income, will experience a real terms cut of £720 per year while the figure across all pension couples is £540 per year. (Joseph Rowntree Foundation.)

Recently we have seen more people coming for help who worried about not being able to feed the family and keep members warm. More low income families, the hardest hit by the present crisis, have to use pre-payment meters. Thus the poorest pay the highest costs for energy. *This can't be right!*

Another worrying cameo is Care Workers who are coming to the Foodbank for help. Many of them who drive from client to client have not yet had an increase in their car mileage rates to compensate from the massive rise in petrol and diesel costs. Added to the other increased costs they are struggling to cope.
